Dear all,

as I write this, we're starting to anticipate the end of the second lockdown, though at the time of writing it's not yet clear exactly how much will change. Some of us are eagerly anticipating being able to do a bit more - I'm certainly looking forward to welcoming back congregations to church -, some of us may feel it's not going to make much difference to their lives, and some of us might be feeling a bit apprehensive. And whatever group you're in, I suspect that you're feeling that this Advent and Christmas is going to be different, and sadder, than usual.

But there are still things to make us hopeful. The continued good news about vaccines, even if it is still some way off from being fully deployable, definitely gives hope for an end to the period of crisis. However hard this December might seem, we know that we're taking precautions not just for ourselves, but out of love and care for others. And while this year continues to be different. there are still things happening to make Advent a special time. We're still looking for people who would be able to join in and create a window display showing part of the Nativity story, or display a poster for our "Nine Lessons and Carols prayer walk", and we're also encouraging everybody to put a star in their window as a sign of hope. You could also contribute to the Wrenthorpe and Kirkhamgate food bank, give a gift for the Home Start hampers through St Mary Magdalene Outwood, or drop off a wrapped, new, gift for a child in need at St Peter's Stanley (please do this before their St Nicholas service on the 6th).

Above all, though, hope is found in the reminder that Christmas is about more than big meals and presents - even about more than time with family and friends. Advent and Christmas point us to the

hope that we find in Christ, the light of the world, in whom we see God becoming a human being and lighting up our darkness.



This year, the Benefice will be using Bishop Nick's book on Advent, Freedom is Coming, as a way of reflecting on Advent and what it means.



After scaling down their plans several times, they decided the pandemic would not stop them marrying, even though their only option was a town hall wedding with two witnesses. They were ready to calk up their various lost deposits up to bad luck, when Emily, who works for Thresholds, a charity supporting people with mental illness, had a good idea. She asked her caterer if they'd be willing to use the money to pay for Thanksgiving dinners to be delivered to Threshold's most vulnerable clients and the caterer agreed. Emily and Billy are still a bit sad they didn't get to celebrate with their

friends, but are happy to have started married life by doing a kind thing.

New Apple Discovered in Wiltshire

Archie Thomas, who works for a wildlife charity, was out walking near his home in the Nadder Valley, Wilts, when he spotted an unusual looking apple and wondered what variety it was. But noone - not even the Royal Horticultural Society's apple experts -recognised it, and it was eventually decided it was a new variety. It's reportedly a good flavoured apple, suitable for eating or cooking. Archie, who plans to try to propagate a new plant, is still considering his options for a name, which might pay tribute to his wife Hannah - though he's rejected his little boy's suggestion of "Ronaldo."

#### Luxury Watches with a Heart

Luxury watches are a bit of an ostentatious display of wealth - but when Londoner William Adoasi started Vitae London back in 2016, he wanted to do things a bit differently. As well as making sure the factory manufacturing his watches paid workers fairly, as a man of African descent, he wanted to do something to give back. Knowing that children are turned away from school if they can't afford school uniform, he decided that for every watch he sold, the company would buy and give away two sets of uniform, plus a school bag and footwear, helping a child access education. At the moment the firm is working in several provinces in South Africa, but they hope to expand into remoter areas of Sub-Saharan Africa if all goes well.

# A recipe from Mother Jo Kershaw: "White Turkey Chilli"

This week we have a lot of leftovers from our Thanksgiving dinner - and in particular, there's a lot of turkey! While you probably don't have large

amounts of leftover turkey right now, we are now beginning to look towards Christmas, and perhaps you're wondering what you might do for Christmas dinner. So while you probably already have a favourite method for dealing with left-over turkey, this is one you might consider. It's a comforting, mild chilli that's great for a dark winter night. And of course it will also work with left-over roast chicken, too.

Serves 2

I small onion, chopped Sunflower or other neutral tasting oil for frying I-2 cloves garlic, minced I mild green chilli pepper, stemmed, deseeded, and chopped I/2 tsp cumin 1/2 tsp coriander 1/2 tsp oregano (Optional: I/4 tsp cayenne pepper) I can cannellini beans, rinsed and drained I red or yellow pepper, chopped 300 ml chicken stock Cold roast turkey or chicken (use your judgement based on what you have!), chopped into bite sized pieces I small pot sour cream Salt and pepper to taste

Fry the onion gently until transparent, then add the garlic, chillies, and spices, and fry for a few minutes more until the pan smells fragrant.

Add the stock, beans, and pepper, and season with salt and pepper. Bring to the boil, then simmer, uncovered, for half an hour.

Add the turkey and bring briefly to the boil, then reduce the heat, add the sour cream, and simmer for a few minutes, stirring until well-combined. Taste and adjust seasoning if needed.

Serve with crusty bread or with rice; you might also like to serve a salad with a sharp dressing. If you only have a small amount of left-over roast meat, you might like to add a drained can of sweetcorn to the pan with the beans and peppers.
