

Good News from Around the World



You will all have seen this good news story already, but let's have it again to cheer us up! Margaret Keenan who turns 91 this week received the first injection of the Coronavirus vaccine on Tuesday 8th December. She said it was the "best early birthday present." Thousands of vaccines have already been distributed to healthcare workers and those over 80 from the first 800,000 doses, and 4 million more doses are due to arrive in the UK from Belgium and Germany by the end of the month.



What have the Romans ever done for us? Teach us the art of mosaics, that's what! National Trust archaeologists at Chedworth, a Roman villa in the Cotswolds, have uncovered a 5th century mosaic in what was the dining room. It is significant as it dates from after the Roman withdrawal from Britain, when living standards were falling, and suggests that despite raids in the east and north of England, at least some people continued to enjoy a comfortable standard of living and high standards of craftsmanship continued into the 'Dark Ages'.

But apart from mosaics, what have the Romans ever done for us?



You might not think of Coventry as a 'City of Culture', but Coventry: City of Culture is a group which promotes the city and its cultural heritage. They have set up 21 portraits of 'Everyday Heroes', voted on by the ordinary people for their acts of kindness and service to other people during the pandemic. The 21 include Kelly Iles, who delivered over 60,000 free meals to local hospitals, and 10-year old Evie Barriscale, who made keyrings to raise money for the children's air ambulance. The portraits will go on baubles on Christmas trees in the city centre.



You might not think of London as a birdwatching destination, but after river restoration projects in London, sightings of kingfishers have increased by 450% since 2000. Big increases have happened in Lewisham and Tower Hamlets which have 10 times more sightings than they used to have. London has 400 miles of riverways, but most are underground. Since 2000, more than 20 miles have been restored

in a project led by Catchment Partnerships in London Group (CPiL), which hopes to see 3 new miles of river every year until 2050.

Christmas recipes from Mother Jo Kershaw: Cinnamon Stars and Lemon Biscuits

Cinnamon stars (Zimtsterne) are one of the most popular German Christmas biscuits - it's hard to imagine a German Christmas without them. Their delicious flavour perfectly evokes the run up to Christmas for me. The method might seem a little unusual, but works very well- you start by making a meringue, and save some of it for an unusual baked icing. They're also gluten and fat free!



A word of advice - the dough can be sticky. You really do need to use the baking parchment when rolling out!

3 egg whites (from medium eggs)
375g icing sugar
2 drops vanilla essence
I tsp ground cinnamon
375g ground almonds

Additional icing sugar for rolling and cutting

In a very clean, large, bowl, beat the eggs into a meringue, forming stiff peaks.

Sieve the icing sugar and fold gently into the meringue, a spoonful or two at a time. Put aside three spoonfuls of meringue for the icing.

Mix the cinnamon, almonds, and vanilla essence together. Carefully mix it in to the meringue. The final result should be only barely sticky - if it is very sticky, add a bit more ground almond.

Roll out the dough between two sheets of baking parchment to about one cm thick. If you have space in your fridge, you might like to cook it for

an hour or two, but if you do, make sure it's on some kind of firm board or you will spoil your work.

Preheat your oven to 120 C/ gas mark 1/2.

Dipping your star cutter into the icing sugar periodically, cut out stars and transfer to a lined baking tray.

Using a brush, coat the top of the stars with the reserved meringue mixture. (If you don't have a pastry brush, you can use a teaspoon)

Bake in the middle of the oven for 15 minutes, then lower the temperature to 100 C/ below mark 1/2 and continue to bake for another ten to fifteen minutes - when they are done, the biscuits will have begun to change colour, but the icing will still be light in colour.

Lemon biscuits

This is another favourite German biscuit, though with a fresher, lighter flavour. (It also contains no hard-to-find spices!). The biscuits that results is not unlike a richer lemon shortbread - if you're in a hurry, they are still good without the icing. The hour's rest in the fridge will make your life much easier when you come to roll the dough out. If you are lactose intolerant, you can of course replace the butter with margarine.

Note: this makes two baking sheets worth of biscuits, and it's hard to make a smaller amount because then you end up trying to half an egg. The biscuits keep well in an airtight tin, but if that is more biscuits than you want at once, you can cut the dough in half and freeze one half for another occasion.



300g flour 200g butter 125g sugar

A few drops of vanilla essence (or replace 25g of the ordinary sugar with vanilla sugar, should you have it) I egg
Zest of half an unwaxed lemon
Juice of half a lemon

For the icing 300g icing sugar Lemon juice

Make a dough using the flour, butter, egg, and sugar - you may find it easier to do this using a dough hook, if your mixer has one. Towards the end, add in the lemon juice and vanilla essence.

Rest the dough in the fridge for an hour.

Preheat the oven to gas mark 3/175 C.

On a floured surface, roll out the dough to about half a centimetre in thickness (or about the height of a pound coin). Cut whatever shapes appeal to you.

Bake for 12 minutes in the centre of the oven, or until golden but not browned. Cool on a wire rack.

Once completely cool, make up a smooth lemon icing, and ice the biscuits. You could add sugar sprinkles, if you like!
